INCREASING ACCESS TO MNCH SERVICES

An essential component of health systems strengthening

The World Health Organisation identifies six building blocks of a functioning health system¹, including health worker staffing, infrastructure, available commodities, effective financing, logistics, and tracking progress. PRRINN-MNCH identifies one other which involves increasing access to services through addressing barriers of awareness, affordability and physical access at household and community levels as well as improving provider accountability to clients. PRRINN-MNCH's community based interventions cover four states in Northern Nigeria with a combined population reached of 2,888,931.


